

When I addressed you this time last year, I was confident that SAAGA would have gained access to at least two markets, India and Japan, and that access to China would have been advanced, following the granting of market access for SA pears by China. As you would recall, avocados are placed next in the queue after pears.

What we did not know was the world was about to change for the worse when COVID-19 hit the globe, freezing international travel and restricting gatherings for people. Some organisations had to close doors temporarily to comply with government protocols on COVID-19. Some of those companies will never open their doors again – the impact was simply too severe.

Agriculture on the other hand became an overnight flavour, as one of the few industries allowed to keep their doors open. Suddenly, everyone realised that when the chips are down, you only need a farmer. The impact of COVID-19, however, has been felt by industry as we were preparing to pop champagne, celebrating access to the markets stated earlier.

Efforts to get governments to relax the inspection regime in light of the travel restriction, did not bear any fruit. As a result, we do not have the access we had hoped for. Hope is not lost, however. The CEO and SAAGA's technical team continue to work hard to make sure that these agreements are finalised.

With the departure of SAMAC three years ago, there was a lot of uncertainty among the Subtrop personnel and doubt among members whether Subtrop would be viable and by implication that SAAGA would be left to carry most of the costs, thus placing the financial burden on SAAGA members. There were questions whether SAAGA should not follow suit and stand on its own as a result. There was a move to give assurance that the structure would be sustainable financially and, that for government relations, it made the umbrella body carry a stronger voice.

One of the benefits pointed out was that the exit of SAMAC would free up the CEO's time to focus on the SAAGA strategic issues which had been clearly outlined. I am happy to say that these benefits have been realised. Subtrop has been able to reorganise and build a strong and stable team of people to support SAAGA's strategic objectives. The Association is now in a much stronger position financially, with a strong balance sheet to cover members should a need arise.

The financial reserves built over the years unlock the opportunity for SAAGA to invest in key strategic projects to gain market access in Asia and America. With the appointment of the Transformation Coordinator, we have begun to invest in emerging grower development programmes to ensure greater participation of black farmers in industry.

Some of the exciting transformation projects are the One Hectare project, which is the development of a hectare of avocado on emerging growers' land. It is aimed at teaching, developing and transforming emerging avocado growers. The project will also be used to link growers, inputs providers, packhouses, government offices and other stakeholders. The partial funding of infrastructure and inputs of SAAGA Cost Sharing at 50/50, is another innovative project that has been rolled out to lend financial support to emerging farmers. SAAGA's partnership with Prokon to train emerging growers in the Levubu area on fruit maturity is yielding positive results.

The new initiative of linking emerging growers to mentors is a project that will undoubtedly grow the industry – we challenge other members to avail themselves to mentor emerging black farmers.

We believe that building a strong pipeline of young people in industry is pivotal. SAAGA has moved to partner with Stellenbosch University and sponsored the horticulture department to introduce a subtropical fruit production course to channel some of the horticulture students towards the subtropical industry. This was successfully implemented.

SAMAC was also invited to come on board to contribute towards this project, and they enthusiastically came to the party. We will continue to invest in this project as part of the industry's sustainable development initiatives.

Local market development is one of the strategic pillars for the Association. SAAGA has increased investment in local market development to grow local consumption of avocado as one of the ways to mitigate the single market risk that the industry faces.

Strengthening government relations was one of the things we said we would undertake, for better coordination of market access efforts. SAAGA's membership in Fruit South Africa through Subtrop ensures that the industry is well represented at Fruit South
